## Financial REPORT

For the 2014–2015 League year, we set an operating budget of \$69,193 and are on track to meet that budget. All of our major fundraisers this year exceeded our expectations, which is always a great outcome. The Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer reported on Junior League's finances at the monthly Board Meeting and General Membership Meetings as well as when questions arose. Monthly financials were completed by Bergan, Paulsen & Company, P.C.

Training was provided during Leadership Training sessions for Committee Chairs to familiarize themselves with the financial procedures of Junior League. Committee budgets were distributed, along with proper procedures for requesting reimbursement through expense authorization forms. Procedures for handling cash and preparing revenue receipts and cash batch reports were also discussed. The 2014–2015 financial budgets allowed for more Members to attend conferences and to help with our kickoff year of the YOLO Y.E.S. project. We were also able to hold speaker nights which were influential and beneficial to Membership. .

## larketing DEVELOPMENT

Marketing continues to grow in our 77th year. We have gone from clipping, snipping and gluing to click, print and distribute. The League Log is our primary marketing tool. It is released three times a year and includes event coverage, images and information that reaches over 500 plus recipients, sponsors and donors. The

League Log showcases our work, educates others and spreads the word about Junior League.

The Weekly Update is a tool we use internally. The Update goes out to our Membership every Friday. It keeps Members informed of opportunities and events going on within League. The revised format has clickable links which helps gives our Members direct access to our website so they can sign up to volunteer and register for events.

Our website continues to grow and offers a good foundation for web presence. Social media platforms like Facebook and Twitter continue to benefit Junior League's Members and our community with instant awareness. Outside marketing help comes from KWWL, local radio stations



and the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Courier. These marketing resources help us reach surrounding communities.

Marketing is constantly evolving and creating awareness is key. We look forward to creating new ways to market our League and learn about other opportunities so we can continue to educate the community on what we do and in turn, benefit the community.

## Community Impact

At the September GMM, the Active Members voted to establish Teen Issues as our official focus area. In the Fall, the Community Impact Committee met with members from local organizations to determine what the needs are for teens in the community and if Junior League would be able to make an impact on the lives of Cedar Valley teens. It was met with great enthusiasm by the local organizations and the CI committee was confident that our time & resources would make a positive impact. After much discussion, it was determined one of the greatest needs in the community was making a valuable connection with middle-school-age students as this is the age when they are most vulnerable to outside influences. We believe we met this need with our YOLO Y.E.S. series as well as our other activities, described below.

## YOLO — Y.E.S. YOUTH EMPOWERMENT SERIES

The Community Impact Committee kicked off our new focus area, Teen Issues, with a youth empowerment series. After polling some young adults, the committee came up with the name, YOLO (You Only Live Once) Y.E.S. (Youth Empowerment Series) for the series of 4 meetings held at Bunger Middle School. About 20 Bunger students came each month to learn important life-skills in a fun environment. At the end of each session, the students who attended were entered into a drawing for gift cards and snacks to take home. At the end of the series, one lucky student had their name drawn to win an iPad mini.

The first session focused on career exploration, with business owners and professionals speaking about what they do and how they got there. In the second meeting, the youngsters learned about healthy eating and exercise. The third meeting included information about financing and household budgeting. In the last session, the students put together everything they learned and were tasked with navigating through life based on their careers, budget, and life choices.



Through the Charity Ball Appeal, Junior League raised \$4,000 to donate towards the AMP (Achieving Maximum Potential) Suitcases for Success Project. This project provides suitcases filled with necessities for youth that are aging out of the foster care system and living on their own for the first time. Our members used \$2,000 to fill six suitcases with bedding, towels, dishes, cookware, toiletries and numerous other items to help these teens get started on their own. We also presented AMP with a check for \$2,000 to help them purchase additional suitcases.





## Additional ACTIVITIES

We offered two opportunities throughout the year for members to stuff backpacks as part of the Backpack Program at the Northeast Iowa Food Bank. The Backpack Program is designed to meet the needs of hungry children at times when other resources are not available, such as weekends and school vacations. We also impacted the community and supported our focus area of Teen Issues by providing wonderful treats & desserts for the Mayors' Top Teen Awards. This awards program recognizes outstanding youth volunteers in our community.

## Community Impact



The Enabling Fund helps meet immediate needs within our community, share Junior League resources without project commitment, and increase Junior League's impact and visibility within our community. Two Enabling Fund grants were awarded during the 2014–15 year.

A \$1,000 grant was awarded to the Salvation Army in October to provide incentives for their mentoring program. In the fall semester, 11 students qualified for a trip to SkyZone in Cedar Rapids by achieving academic goals set specifically for them. For example, one student had been struggling in his science classes and had stopped trying altogether. This student set a goal to raise his grade in science from an F to a B. By the end of the semester, he had achieved his goal and was able to go on the trip to SkyZone.

The second \$1,000 grant was awarded to the Making a Difference in the Middle project at Waverly-Shell Rock Middle School in February. Funds will be used to purchase fabric for 175 pillowcases. Eighth graders will sew the pillow cases and donate them to Iowa children undergoing cancer treatment. This project provides an opportunity to help these middle schoolers experience accomplishment in creating a product and teaches them about the importance of helping others in need.

Big changes are coming not only to the Junior League of Waterloo-Cedar Falls but to many Junior Leagues around the nation. AJLI (Association of Junior Leagues International) has spent the past several years looking at ways to ensure the longevity and success of all Junior Leagues. They worked with a selection of Junior Leagues across the nation to determine what ways we can accomplish this goal. They split the work into 3 main areas: Governance/Management, Issue Based Community Impact, and Membership. This year JLWCF decided to participate in the Governance and Management portion of this strategic transformation. The purpose of this transformation is to split the leadership into a Governance Board and a Management Team. The Governance Board is responsible for the strategic plan and long term planning of Junior League to ensure we remain an integral part of the community. The Management Team is responsible for the day to day decisions and developing and implementing programs to achieve community impact through the skills of its Members.

We are almost done with the transformation through AJLI, and as of this next League year, we will have a Governance Board and Management Team to move forward. We are sure there will be some kinks to work through, but we are excited to move forward. Past board members, and especially past presidents, found it challenging to give as much focus to the strategic planning for the League as is needed. This new system will provide very positive change for our League and other Junior Leagues across the nation.

## Fund Development

Junior League is honored to be the choice for so many this year when deciding ways to give back to your community. Whether you donated cash, auction items, office supplies, time or services, we are grateful. All of these pieces work together to bring fundraising, fun events and community impact the biggest return for your dollar. 

Dinner was paired with spectacular wine provided by Dr. Michael C. Hollen (Orthodontics), and gourmet cupcakes from Hy Vee were the perfect end to the delicious feast.

Dinner accompanied the program and featured the chance to unlock a Treasure Chest worth over \$900 in local gift certificates, a raffle to win a gorgeous necklace donated by Facets by Susong (won by Traci McCausland), and a live auction. 


## PROMS CLOSET

Not all dresses were sold however! In fact 24 vouchers were given out for free dresses, of which 11 were redeemed!
