### IN THE KITCHEN....

Junior League Memebers have been providing healthy snacks for AMP's monthy meetings. These snacks help fuel the foster kids who attend these meetings but can also be a great snack for adults too! Make this simple dip for you or the kids in your family and crunch yourself to healthy eating!

White Bean Hummus 1 (24- ounce) can cannellini beans or (1/2 pound dried) 1 lemon, juiced 1 tsp ground cumin 2 garlic cloves chopped 1/2 cup tahini paste salt and pepper to taste (optional) 1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil \*To cook dried beans, soak them overnight in plenty of water. Drain, put them in a pot, and cover them with fresh water by 1-inch. Bring them to a boil lower the heat, and simmer until they are tender, about 30-40 minutes.

Put the beans into the bowl of a food processor. Add the lemon juice, cumin, garlic, tahini paste, and salt and pepper to taste. Turn processor on and slowly pour in the olive oil. Process until smooth and thick.

Serve with veggie sticks or save in fridge for up to 2 weeks in a sealed container.

# Sustainer Happenings

If there is one thing that Sustainers enjoy, it's an opportunity to gather together socially. We had a great turnout at our Holiday Party in December and recently at our second outing in Feburary. There are several Sustainer groups that gather for reasons other than social (but we still manage to do a little of that). The "morning" book group meets the second Tuesday of the month to discuss a book and share others that they have enjoyed. The dozen or so women who come always provide a variety of opinions. The "evening" book group meets the third Tuesday of the month with a core group of 8–10 women. Both groups make selections months in advance to ensure there is enough time to read the book and have a meaningful discussion.

The 16 members meet on the fourth Thursday of the month. The Night Traders (TNT) has been meeting the second Tuesday of the month since 2001. The 20 members have assigned stock sectors to follow and make suggestions for purchases. The third group (Generators Investment Partners) has recently disbanded.

The "oldest" sustainer group (meaning it has existed the longest) is Bridge Marathon. Thirty-two members meet for eight matches (set up by the players) between August and April. There is a nominal fee that is used to help pay for mailings, an end of year party, and small prizes.
